"The American-Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee (ADC) was founded in 1980 to defend the rights of people of Arab descent and to promote their rich ethnic heritage" (<u>source</u>). Under the leadership of the nation's first Arab American Senator, James George Abourezk, ADC "became and remains the preeminent grassroots organization representing Arab Americans" (<u>source</u>).

In honor of Arab-American Heritage Month, we delved into the library's online archives of *ADC Times* to learn more about Pittsburgh's involvement with this notable organization.

In February 1984, ADC reported that an Arabic-speaking doctor from Pittsburgh is considering moving to the San Joaquin Valley to serve Yemeni farm workers.

Conditions Ripen for Doctors to Serve Yemenis

Meanwhile, ADC's efforts to provide medical services to the 6,000 to 8,000 Yemeni farm workers in the San Joaquin Valley have begun to bear fruit. Two doctors from, respectively, Chicago and Pittsburgh answered an appeal in *ADC Reports* #20 for Arabic-speaking doctors to move there and set up a practice to provide medical service for the Yemenis. The doctors explained that they will visit the area before deciding to set up a practice there.
